






Artist Darrell Wakelam shows you how to make a beautiful Ammonite inspired by fossils from the Lyme Regis Museum.



All you need is cardboard, masking tape, glue, scissors, some old magazines and a few matchsticks, straws or rolls of paper.

1 - Attach two pencils together, push on into the middle of a card base and draw a spiral.

As you draw it the cardboard strip wraps around the pencil making it shorter, creating the spiral.

You may need to darken this and finish off the centre.

2 - Cut some thin strips of card and tape them around the spiral . . .

it's easier if you start from the centre and work outwards. 3 - Next use a strip as a guide to draw lines pointing to the centre.



Get some other materials ready, straws, matches, cocktail sticks.



4 - Start to glue these on, thicker at the outside, getting thinner in the centre.



5 - Tear up old magazines for colours.



6 - Glue these into the sections . . .



... adding different colours.



7 - Paint or colour the straws.








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




Cut a 'leaf shape' for the body from the centre of the plate, keep the other part for fins.



5 - Cut out teeth by following the lines on the plate, like this .




7 - Then cut out two smaller fins to go on the 'hidden' side of the body, like this .







If you wanted to you could paint an underwater background too?




TO THE WAY

then tape these parts together.



## **DINOSAUR CLAY FUN**



Roll each leg to look like a party sausage.



Each leg should stand on it's own without support. 3 Squeeze the ends of the body and roll in your hands to create a banana shape.



Pick an end of the clay banana as the tail and one as the head. Make the tail more pointy and round the end of the head.





Use a serrated dinner knife to make a mouth. This will give a tooth effect.

6 Stick the body down onto the standing legs. Then turn upside down to smooth the leg and body clay into each other to join.





7 Use netting from fruit, lay it on to the dinosaur. Stroke your dinosaur gently until the material starts to disappear. Do this all over. Other textures you could try are orange peel or melon peel. Once the texture is complete add eyeballs.





8 EXTENSION

You now have a basic dinosaur.

Is it wearing a hat and scarf?

Holding an ice cream in it's tail?

Carrying a baby dinosaur on it's back?

Use your accessories clay to personalise your dinosaur.

9 Is your dinosaur hungry?

Push some clay into the back of a leaf, then peel off the leaf.

## **CLAY FUN - MAKING MARY ANNING**

You can use air drying clay, a homemade playdough or clay



Split your ball of clay in half, divide one half in half again. Keep dividing until you have these sections.



With the large half of clay make a bell shape. Pinch the inside of the bell slightly, this gives the effect of folds in the fabric

From two of the smallest balls roll two long sausages to the same length and join them onto the bell shape for arms.



Cut them to size. You may wish to push your little finger inside to make sleeves, then add a pea sized ball for hands.





With one of the two medium sized balls of clay roll a long thin sausage shaped. Long enough to go around Mary. Blend the clay up to the top and cut off any excess.

With one of the smallest balls make the head The remaining medium ball of clay is for accessories, take some to make the hair.







From two of the smallest balls of clay make two pinch pots. The deepest can be used for the basket, the other for her hat.













Create a wicker texture by drawing lines along and down with a fork. Use some of the remaining clay to roll a handle for the basket.

You can use the remainder of your clay to make accessories. Lots of ammonites and bones to go in the basket. Keep the clay wet so it does not crack when you coil the ammonite shapes.







Once the clay is dry (about 10 days) you could use poster paints or acrylic paint to decorate. A bit of PVA glue on the fossils will give a wet look.
