A very Happy Birthday to Jacob, Dottie and Rosanna who all celebrate their birthdays this week.



They learned about how Poole's Cavern got its name and they saw where the Stone age people used to live.









The Big Question

Wednesday's "Big Question" assembly asked the children;


"Why am I here?"

The children broke off into their house teams to discuss.

The purple team decided — We are here to make the world a better place. If humans weren't created, the world would be quite empty. We can make it better by planting more trees and flowers for example. The green team said- The Earth could probably survive without us so we are just extra so we should be grateful to be here and live a happy and full life

Red team's views were - To keep the food chain working correctly. For example, if humans didn't eat salmon, there would be more in the ocean and therefore eating more of their food, krill. There would then be less krill eating Plankton, and therefore too much in the ocean. Harmful algal would then bloom. These can decrease the sunlight and oxygen in the water, which can disrupt the natural ecosystem!

Yellow team agreed- We are here to look after the Earth such as plants and animals.




National Online Safety

Ofcom's annual 'Children and Parents: Media Use and Attitudes' report provides a comprehensive picture of how young people used and interacted with the internet in the preceding year. It's a fascinating snapshot of what games and apps young people are currently favouring, how long they spend online and how tastes change at certain ages.

While some of Ofcom's latest findings will probably come as scant surprise (YouTube being by far the most popular platform among under-18s, for instance), other conclusions may raise an eyebrow or two. This special #WakeUpWednesday guide presents some of the report's most eye-catching facts and figures in an accessible infographic format.

In the guide you'll find statistics and trends such as the current most popular platforms for young people and the proportion of children in each age group who play online games.

Flickers


This week Flickers class gave been recreating the artwork of William Morris. They produced some lovely drawings.


They have been writing about Katie Morag.

The jelly was the Earth's core and the children then had to build their structures using the spaghetti strands stuck together with marshmallows.


The aim was to see if the structure could withstand an Earthquake. So, they placed their structures on top on the jelly and wobbled to simulate the earthquakes shakes.
